It's been great to see Bredon's community spirit in action this term. Whole school highlights have included raising £510 for Children in Need through cookie sales and £450 for Save the Children through our Christmas Jumper Day. We have collected much-needed goods on behalf of Caring Hands of Evesham's Food Bank and shoeboxes for Operation Christmas Child. Pupils in 6 Brook have also been collecting for a reverse advent calendar to support the food bank at Evesham Adventure Playground.



On 12 November, Amelia A and Isla C represented pupils and staff of Bredon Hill Academy at Broadway's Remembrance service. With Miss West, they laid a wreath at the war memorial and then attended the service at St Michael's Church. In school, we raised over £80 for the poppy appeal.



As part of Mrs Parkinson's Enrichment sessions, pupils in year 8 are taking it in turns to organise, promote, bake and then sell some sweet treats once every half-term. So far, thanks to the delicious efforts of 8 Hill and 8 Tower, we have raised £236 for mental health charity Young Minds and over £200 for Children with Cancer UK. As a consequence of the weather, we moved our planned



Focus on Enrichment

Pupils in years 7 and 8 are continuing this academic year with their Enrichment Studies. These take place every Blue Thursday for two hours on halftermly rotations. The sessions enable pupils to explore learning and concepts that go beyond the National Curriculum, reflecting our school motto of 'Learning Together for Success' across a range of different contexts.

In year 7 pupils cover IDEA (Inspiring Digital Enterprise Award), German, First Aid, Weaving, Character Development and Wellbeing. The sessions are always very positively received and we evaluate their impact and enjoyment with pupils before making refinements every year.

Focus on English

This term has been a busy and text-rich one. Pupils have been actively learning in English. Each day we see pupils showing their Academy values of belief, honesty and aspiration. We truly have been 'Learning Together for Success'.

We welcomed our new year six cohort with the novel by Catherine Johnson 'Race to the Frozen North'. The year six theme for the year is 'Journeys'. We all enjoyed following Matthew Henson's journey to the Arctic as the pupils started their new journey at Bredon Hill Academy. Along the way, we learnt about resilience, prejudice, perseverance, injustice and how views about race have changed over a century. Pupils developed their retrieval, comprehending, summarising, questioning and



inferring skills whilst reading the text. They all developed their writing skills by completing emotional letters and diary entries in the voice of Matthew Henson. In particular, pupils developed vocabulary choices, sentence structures and paragraphing skills.



All year six pupils have been encouraged to think carefully about their personal reading choices and to challenge themselves to read a variety of writers, and ensure they are reading books that are ageappropriate. At present, Year 6 are exploring the translated novel by Daniel Pennac 'Eye of the Wolf'. This enables them to draw connections through setting, character, themes and language. They have also been

introduced to Spelling Frame and Year 6 SATs Boot Camp to close gaps and secure Year 6 grammar, punctuation and spelling knowledge and practice.

Year seven were welcomed back after a summer of reading to explore the concepts of heroism and villainy. They have all studied a modern novel looking at Joseph Campbell's 'The Hero's Journey'. The year group have been challenged to begin their KS3 curriculum by questioning: how do students use quotes to support their opinions whilst exploring how writers construct continuous texts? We were very pleased to be able to participate in the Book Buzz initiative again this year; we hope all pupils enjoyed their gift of a new book. Year eight learning is based around the concept of 'conflict' in English. They have all been given the opportunity to read a modern novel and learn about how different writers open and end their novels and develop the concept of conflict through them. The cohort were challenged to



explore extended metaphors and how thematic strands run through texts. We enjoyed reading all their creative ideas and hope to see some pupils becoming famous authors in the future!



The whole school have experienced our Scholastic Book Fair and the competition to win a book. Congratulations to our winners: Bess, Jack and Harriet. This gave pupils and staff the opportunity to see, feel and discuss books. We made £968.48 and will put our £409 of reward points towards new books for our Library. The library has been running every lunchtime. Our year eight librarians have enjoyed helping their peers

choose their next read and providing a quiet space for reading. Our clubs have been running through the term, and pupils have enjoyed films, debating and reading. The English Department

Focus on History

Year 6 have completed their first topic in history 'What is history?' Pupils are equipped now with a knowledge of history skills to be finishing off their KS2 studies in history with the topic, 'Life Achievements and the Legacy of the Ancient Greeks'.

Year 7 are continuing with their studies on the impact of the Norman Conquest on England. This has included a successful trip to Warwick Castle, where pupils were given the opportunity to climb 'The Mound' (site of the original Motte and Bailey castle), climb the towers and ramparts and visit the state rooms amongst other parts of the castle. Pupils also witnessed the trebuchet show, which included the firing of it, and The Falconer's Quest—a fantastic show of the birds of prey and a definite highlight of the trip for many of the year group.

Year 8 are continuing with their studies on crime and punishment through time. Pupils have relived what it was like to be alive in medieval and Tudor times and have gained an understanding of what the worst punishment involved (think Gunpowder Plotters), how women were treated if they were accused of witchcraft and how the country was divided during the Civil War.

History Club members have been making models based around Roman events. All years are welcome to History Club. It runs at 11.50am Tuesday lunchtimes in Room 7.



Focus on Physical Education

It's been another busy term of sporting participation at Bredon Hill Academy, with many successes and memorable moments to celebrate. Our highlights have included:

- Coaching sessions provided to year 8 girls from Bredon Star RFC;
- Great participation and success in the district cross-country competition, including our year 6 and year 7 boys' and girls' teams finishing first and a whopping 17 pupils across years 6, 7 and 8 qualifying for the county round;
- Excellent success in the Sportshall District Team Competition, held at TDMS school, with a particular mention to our year 6 mixed gender and year 7 boys' teams who ran out winners;
- Our year 7 and 8 boys' football teams were district champions earlier in the term and our year 7 girls' were runners-up in their tournament;
- Consistently high levels of participation across interhouse football competitions, particularly across the year 6 tournament, which will be finished in the new year. In year 7, Avon were crowned champions with a 100% record, whilst Brook won the year 8 league;
- A unique netball interhouse competition, held indoors due to the significant rainfall and seeing Hill take the trophy. Earlier in the term, Castle were worthy winners of the year 8 competition.













Focus on French

This term, pupils in year 6 have developed the basics in French, ensuring that they can express themselves in full sentences and understand short, simple spoken and written passages. We have been very pleased with the engagement and interest of our pupils for this subject; it's been a very promising start to their language journey at BHA.

Year 7 pupils have enjoyed using a wide range of adjectives, intensifiers and the comparative, as well as the key verbs 'être' and 'avoir' to write detailed descriptions: descriptions of themselves in their first penpal letters and of the different characters in the 'Astérix and Obélix' comics.

Year 8 pupils have developed their cultural understanding of food and drinks in France and other French speaking countries. They also enjoyed finding out what typical meals consist of, and described their own typical, recent and future meals in detail, using key verbs in the present, past and future tenses. They also developed expressing longer opinions with a range of reasons.

This year again, we are continuing with our penpal exchange with our partner school in France, Le Collège Mauboussin in Mamers. All year 7 pupils have written their first letter and have received their first letters. Year 8 pupils have written letters describing their typical school day and expressing opinions about their different school subjects.

Focus on PSHE and Careers

In PSHE, Year 6 pupils have been learning about different types of families, Year 7 pupils have been learning about Parliament and Year 8 pupils have been learning about keeping themselves safe - financially, online and personally. Year 8 pupils have been learning about County Lines in the context of keeping safe and completed the year by watching 'Notice Me' - a film made and produced last year by pupils of their age at another middle school.



All pupils received a talk to help further their understanding of our fundamental British Values: democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance. Delivered by a local PCSO, this helped pupils appreciate the impact and power of their words and actions.

Additionally, our Key Stage Three pupils had a presentation from West Mercia Police focusing on Operation Sceptre—a nationwide police campaign highlighting the dangers and impact of knife crime. Although we live in an incredibly safe area, we still feel it's important to raise

awareness of these issues across our school community. Both presentations were very well received, with some great questions raised.

We have been fortunate to have visitors to Bredon Hill Academy providing careers inspiration. Help2 Fly created an airport and aeroplane experience for some Year 7 and Year 8 pupils. Two former alumni of Bredon Hill Academy came to give a very enlightening talk and interactive session about engineering apprenticeships on behalf of GE Aerospace. During the final week of term, we had a great day of careers -related learning. Year 6 took a step into the NHS, learning about different career opportunities; year 7 completed the Warburton's Challenge of creating and marketing their own bakery products; year 8 learned all about CV writing skills.

Focus on Music

Our BHA Singers had the opportunity to perform with other singers from Prince Henry's High School and St Egwin's this term at a vocal workshop in November. About 60 voices, rehearsing a number of songs together, filled the classroom at PHHS. This workshop was our first joint venture of the year. Our second came when the three schools joined forces to help with the Advent Service at All Saints Church, Evesham on 7th December. BHA Singers gave a beautiful performance of 'Diamond Bright' during this service.



Following this performing success, 86 pupils were involved in our Christmas Concert on 11th December. Musicians, soloists and poets from all years took to the stage to present and perform a variety of festive numbers. It was a fantastic evening of entertainment that was enjoyed by more than 200 parents, carers, friends and family.



Focus on Extra-Curricular

With 85% of pupils regularly engaging with our extra-curricular opportunities last term, our provision is thriving. There's something for everyone, from interhouse sports competitions to Minecraft, singing and bird-watching.

Our **Debate Club** gives pupils the space and opportunity to develop their listening, speaking and reasoning skills.



Each week, participants are given topics to discuss, explore and debate through a variety of games, activities



and formal debates. This term we have been challenging ourselves to support our opinions with valid evidence.

In our recent 'big debate', pupils in year 8 discussed whether mobile phones should be banned in school, prompted by the Education Secretary Gillian Keegan's recent announcement in October that they should be. This was a lively debate whereby both sides gave well considered points and delivered thoughtful responses.

We have also discussed other important topics such as Winter vs

Summer, online text vs writing, sweets vs chocolate and desert island must haves! We are very much looking forward our next term, kicking off with another 'big debate'.

STEM Club runs on every Wednesday at the beginning of lunch in Labs 1, 2 and 3—pupils across all year groups are welcome This term has included various science based activities: spooky elephants' tooth-paste (in a pumpkin), a moss safari, bath bomb product development and much more.

Mrs Bartlett has been thrilled with the participation and interest generated from **Textiles Club**, which is a new addition to our range of clubs. Elsewhere, our pupils have been reliving their parents/carers' youth with the help of Mr Bailey's **Retro-Games Club**: finding out that games that used to take several minutes to load through a cassette and featured blocky graphics are far more entertaining than what's on offer nowadays!

Through popular demand, Mrs Oakley has resumed **Chess Club**, with a lovely mixture of novices and highly experienced players. From January, Mrs Dunkley will be running a **Rubik's Cube Club**—any spare good-quality 3x3 cubes that could be donated to the school would be gratefully received. Later in the term, we will also be



looking to offer a Pokemon Card Trading Club, such is the level of popularity amongst pupils at present!
